This Tuesday marks the 500th anniversary of the Reformation movement. **But what other** significant events and individuals allow us to have freedom in Christ today?




In 325 AD Emperor Constantine called church leaders to a resort town of Nicea, in an attempt to find unity on the subject of the nature and character of Jesus Christ.




The Hiberno-Scottish Mission: The earliest recorded Irish mission can be dated to 563 with the foundation of Iona by the Irish monk, Columba. During the dark ages (590-1215 AD), missionaries from Ireland spread Christianity to Europe.



Cyril and Methodius were sent out by the Greek Orthodox church (860-885) to preach and translate the scriptures into the Slavic languages.




Peter Waldo (1140-1205 AD) preached the word of God when it was illegal to do so. The Waldensians studied in alpine mountain caves then spread the message in the towns below.



John Wycliffe (1330-1384 AD) translated the scriptures into English and considered the scriptures of higher authority than the church.



Jan Hus taught at the university and preached in a church in Prague that had required preaching in the language of the people ever since the ministry of Cyril and Methodius.



"The Church of Christ in Bohemia greets the Church of Christ in England, and yearns to share in its confession of the holy faith by the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ." —excerpt from a letter (September 1410) from Jan Hus to Richard Wyche.




Martin Luther a former Roman priest and monk nailed 95 theses to the door of the church in Wittenberg on October 31, 1517.


He most strongly objected to the selling of indulgences to fund the building of St. Peter's in the Vatican. He also taught the authority of the scriptures and salvation by grace.





James and Robert Haldane established 85 churches in Scotland and Ireland and trained ministers in their school. Churches planted by the Haldanes practiced baptism by immersion, weekly communion, and autonomous government.



American Restoration leaders, Thomas and Alexander Campbell and Walter Scott all attended the school started by the Haldane brothers in Scotland.








All of these men as well as countless other Christians allow us to be simply followers of Christ. Now, let's examine our text for today and see what it can teach us.
